

Applications: Putting Computer Projection Theory into Practice

Classroom Use

Student Use

Use a projector to display your school's logo to help the team make a snazzy entrance onto the court or field. Or, if you need to create paper banners, trace from a projected image.

Host a pizza party and show a movie as a fun and cost-effective school spirit event. Or, project a giant game board on the floor or wall for a larger-than-life game of checkers, chess, four square, or word search.
